
Undergraduate Research

What do you do in your spare time? Lately, I've been spending a lot of time hanging out with our four-month old daughter. Aside from that, listening to music, reading books, traveling, cooking and spending time with my friends and family are my go-to activities.

What is your favorite memory of being a student? My favorite memories from school have very little to do with academics, but I think that is true for most people. All of my favorite memories from both high school and college involve my friends, most specifically the month we spent in Europe when we were college freshman. It was a trip sponsored by our college. In fact, it was the first time I had ever flown on an airplane. We were all 18 and we travelled from Amsterdam to Rome, with a bunch of stops along the way. For all of us, it was a kind of freedom we had never experienced before. I laughed for the entire month, a good measure of time well spent.



What's one experience you've had that has helped shape who you are as a teacher? Being around great teachers constantly pushes me towards getting better. A whole bunch of research suggests that most teachers don't really improve beyond their third year, and often they get worse. I think about that a lot. I'm lucky to be around some truly exceptional teacher's every day, and I'm luckier still to count some of them as my best friends. Their dedication, diligence and craftsmanship provide me with a North Star, something I can move towards but never reach. There is a tendency to see teachers as interchangeable parts. I cannot overstate the rarity of finding teachers like some of the ones we have here at our school, and I get the impression that our students know this too.

What do you want your former students to tell your future students about you? I hope they say that they learned a lot, that they had a good experience in my class and that I worked hard to do well.

What is one thing you could not live without? Aside from the obvious...freedom of speech (pardon me for being so grandiose). I suppose I could live without it, but I wouldn't want to. Everything that is good in life proceeds from it.

What would you like to tell yourself at age 16? Like many kids, I worried a lot at that age. So I suppose that I would tell myself to relax a bit more. Then again, worry has served me well as a good motivator.

How is teaching an IB course different than teaching any other course? For me, the biggest difference is in the amount and type of preparation it requires. I know that kids taking these classes expect a strong performance from their teachers. I spend many hours learning new content and trying to create an experience that engages the kids in my classes. Many days my efforts have succeeded. Some days they flop.

What advice would you give to a student considering an IB course? Be sure that you know your strengths and limitations. It is not enough to simply be curious about a subject. You have to be committed to doing the work.

What characteristics do you feel make a good IB student? A good IB student is diligent and interested and values discussion.
